How much does it cost?

Can I touch that?

we cannot touch the artworks in the museum, there are several child-friendly installations and activities we can touch. For the location of these fun touchable installations, please check out the Touch Sensory Friendly Map on page 5.

Will the museum be loud?

There are places in the museum that can be loud and there are places that are quieter. You can locate these spaces using the Sound Sensory Friendly Map on page 3.

Can I eat or drink in the museum?

Food and drink are for enjoying, but not inside the galleries. Water bottles and snacks may be left in complimentary lockers along with totes & backpacks.

Where can I put my stuff?

Free secure 12"x 12" lockers are available in the coatroom during your visit. We ask that you leave backpacks or large bags in lockers for the safety of the collection.

Can I draw in the museum?

Yes, you can. Bring a sketch pad and pencils (colored or graphite) or tablet computer to sketch your favorite pieces or the beautiful views.

What can I bring to the museum?

Do you need help with planning or accommodations?



Is there anything I should know before visiting?


Wheelchairs, strollers, and portable gallery stools are available for use during your visit. The museum is universally accessible. Temperatures can fluctuate from gallery to gallery and some spaces are quite chilly. The museum is generally quiet, but there are speakers in the lobby that occasionally play sound and a couple of artworks that emit sound.



The museum is mostly well-lit to very well-lit, but some galleries have lower light in order to reduce light damage to artworks.



The museum is interactive, but there are only a few things which visitors are allowed to touch. When an artwork is touched it can be damaged, so to be safe, we have placed signs in the museum telling you what can be touched.
